Knox County Sheriff Officer Training

The Knox County Sheriff's Office is part of the Knoxville Police Department's ambitious goal to train the sworn officers in the city and county in an 8-hour curriculum on elder abuse. This training is team taught by representatives of the Knox County Sheriff's Office, Adult Protective Services, Helen Ross McNabb Center, and the Knox County District Attorney General's Office. 72 Officersincluding the trainers—have already been trained as of the end of February with several hundred to follow. By September 2018, over 800 officers are expected to have been trained under this grant which makes Knoxville-Knox County among the most trained communities in the country on this topic. Additionally, 100+ investigators including 81 KCSO investigators—will receive advanced training on abuse.

Engaging the Faith Community on Elder Abuse

We asked 147 older adults where services for elder abuse victims should be offered. Nearly 62% (n=84) felt that a church, synagogue, mosque, or other faith community building would be a good place to hold such services. This is because older adults in our community recognize places of worship as a safe, reliable setting for sharing fears and getting help. The Elder Abuse Community Outreach Program recognizes the important role that the faith community places in

the lives of older adults.


