Preventing Elder Abuse

Throughout the grant period, we have shared several updates on what we are doing to help respond to instances of elder abuse. These responses have included additional training for law enforcement, social workers, judges, prosecutors, and community members. They have included looking at big picture changes for all older victims including having each of our partners look at their internal responses to these cases for any improvements as well as looking for community solutions such as increasing housing for victims. We have offered direct services to victims through the Office on Aging's case management wing. But all of this work is related to the response of abuse cases. Where does prevention come in?

Our grant rules keeps us from taking a prevention focus. But there are things we call can do to prevent elder abuse:

- Put eyes on people. Checking in on friends or loved ones to let them know—and others around them that they are not forgotten.
- what you can to ensure they are in touch with the community through news, through events, and routines such as church services and senior center visits.
- Remember social services. Older adults and their families are not alone in Knoxville. Programs such as the Office on Aging's Daily Living Center or Contact Care Line's Daily Assurance Calls can be a boost to older adults and their families who need help in caring and communicating with their loved ones. Such services can help stop problems before they even start.

Wrapping Things Up

It is hard to believe that we are coming to the end of the official grant period. Over the course of 2.5 years, we have made historic gains in our community. More than 500 officers have received this training, and more will continue to do so. We've brought people to the table that weren't there before. We have offered case management services to victims, helping them move on with their lives as survivors. The grant has accomplished many important things. But it has also been just one

part of a much larger communitywide effort that says Knoxville-Knox County will not tolerate elder abuse. As we look to the official close out date of September 30, 2018, there are still some things needing to be accomplished. Some parts of this project—such as case management—will continue beyond this date. Other new, exciting opportunities will come into play as well. Stay tuned for updates on where our office is going from here. Together we can keep making a difference.

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World Elder Abuse Awareness Day — June 15

of Elder Law of East Tennessee. Her presentation on
legal, financial, and care planning for elders meshes
well with the occasion.

- The <u>National Center on Elder Abuse</u> has a hashtag campaign related to raising awareness on this subject.
- The federal <u>Elder Justice Initiative</u> has a webinar on June 13 that discusses leveraging national resources in the local fight against elder abuse.
- On June 19, Knoxville will host statewide CCR tour discussing a new model for serving older victims.
