Victim Service Provider Trainings

Another major component of the elder abuse grant is training for elder abuse victim service providers. This 8-hour training is designed for system advocates (such as those working at Family Justice Center, with law enforcement, or with the DA's Office); community advocates (such as those working at Helen Ross McNabb Center and other community-based advocacy organizations); and the aging network (such as Adult Protective Services, Office on Aging, Area Agency on Aging & Disability, and the medical community). The collaboration between these partners is essential to ensure

that survivors have the tools necessary to move on with their lives, that the criminal justice system has the support it needs to be able to focus on their job, and so that a victim -centered response can be maintained throughout the entire process.

Judicial Institute

Training is offered to a variety of partners within the elder abuse grant. Law Enforcement and victim service providers receive all day trainings. Prosecutors and judges receive intensive, multi-day training. The Prosecutors training was showcased in our December 2016 newsletter. In August 2017, three judges from Knox County attended the Judicial Institute on Elder Abuse in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

The Judicial Institute on Elder Abuse took participants through aging and dynamics of elder abuse and applied those lessons to practical courtroom case studies. There was also in-depth programs on fact finding in elder abuse cases, leadership and access to justice, and as well as fairness and cultural issues related to aging.

When asked his thoughts on the conference, one judge said the event was very worthwhile and that the case studies show just how important the coordinated efforts of multiple partners are.



Another said he gained insights that will make him more aware of elder abuse issues as he reviews the applications for warrants.

Not every grant community was successful in recruiting judges for this institute. Based on the feedback received by Knox County judges, that is unfortunate. Knoxville's elder abuse grant benefited from Attorney General Charme Allen's support for the conference and her office's invitation to these judges. This partnership speaks to one of the overarching lessons of this grant. Elder abuse cases are complex and require the help and expertise of multiple partners from the time elder abuse is discovered through the legal process and recovery for the survivor.

The courtroom is a major stage in the fight against elder abuse. But that alone is not enough. Overcoming elder abuse in Knox County requires the engagement of everyone from social service organizations, to the justice system, to every day people who come across abuse.
