Tuesday, September 20 1:00 PM

The Smartest and Dumbest Things I've Seen in My Many Years of Elder Law Practice

Speaker: Anne McKinney, Esq.

Anne McKinney is one of our favorite speakers. She brings both expertise and an energetic and entertaining style to her talks! In this presentation she will share with us many of the pitfalls and triumphs she has witnessed over the many years she has practiced elder law. For example, who should you pick (or not pick) for your executor or power of attorney person? How should you handle distributions to children who lack adequate business sense? Should you discuss (and how) your estate and power of attorney plans with your family before they come into play? Anne will discuss these and many other questions that come up in her practice on a daily basis. Be sure to bring your questions!

Anne McKinney is a Knoxville attorney who has practiced tax and elder law (wills, estates, trusts, conservatorships etc.) for over 40 years. She is a graduate of Duke University (magna cum laude) and the University of North Carolina School of Law. Before opening her own firm Anne was an estate and gift tax attorney with the IRS for ten years. She is a Fellow of the prestigious American College of Trust and Estate Counsel (ACTEC) and has served for several years as an adjunct professor at the University of Tennessee College of Law.

Tuesday, September 20 2:30 PM

Reflections on Poland, its People and its Place in the World Speaker: Victor Ashe

Victor Ashe was this country's ambassador to Poland for five years. During that time he developed a deep understanding and appreciation for the country and its people. Join us as Victor shares with us his experiences and the insights gained as our ambassador to this ally of the United States. In addition, he will explain the importance of Poland in the world and comment on its relationship with Ukraine after the Russian invasion of that country.

Victor Ashe is a native of Knoxville and is a graduate of Yale University and the University of Tennessee College of Law. His life has been one of public service serving as a member of both the Tennessee House of Representatives and Senate. After serving in the Legislature he served for 16 years as the mayor of Knoxville. He and his wife, Joan, and their family live in West Knoxville.

Thursday, September 22 1:00 PM The Butterflies of Cades Cove in the Smokies

Speaker: Warren Bielenberg

When many folks contemplate Cades Cove they think only of the deer, turkey and bear that call Cades Cove home. But there's much more there. In the Cove are many varied species of butterflies. In this presentation Mr. Bielenberg will share with us the types of butterflies found there, how they are inventoried on a yearly basis, as well as their habitat, needs and threats in this unique environment. He will also share numerous photographs of butterflies in Cades Cove which he has made over the years.

Warren Bielenberg is a retired U.S. Park Service Ranger with 34 years of service. Living in Maryville, Warren currently serves as a volunteer in Cades Cove and is an avid birder, photographer and nature enthusiast.

Thursday, September 22 2:30 PM The Experience of the Trail of Tears Speaker: Michael Woods, Ph.D.

Do you think of the Trail of Tears period in American history as only having dealt with the Cherokee and lasting for a relatively short period of time in the 1830s? The event was actually a two decades long affair involving five tribes in the Southeast (Cherokee, Choctaw, Creek, Chickasaw and Seminole), occurred over more than one route and passed through nine states. Join us as we dig more deeply into this very interesting, though tragic, period of our nation's history-a period which still affects the nation's relations with the affected tribes.

Michael Woods is an associate professor in the history department at the University of Tennessee and is the Director of The Papers of Andrew Jackson project. A published author, Dr. Woods received his Ph.D from the University of South Carolina and his primary area of teaching and research is nineteenth century United States history.

Tuesday, September 27 1:00 PM

The Story of a Hidden Jewel; the Knoxville Botanical Garden and Arboretum

Speaker: Nissa Dahlin-Brown, E.D., Assoc. AIA

How many of us can honestly say that we have actually visited the Knoxville Botanical Garden and Arboretum ("KBGA") – or even know where it is? The 47-acre KBGA on Wimpole Avenue in East Knoxville began as part of a land grant in the 1780s to a member of the Howell family. Subsequently five generations of the Howell family established and ran the site as Howell Nurseries for over 100 years and in the process developed many plants that are still popular today. In the early 2000s the last of the Howells transferred the property to a non-profit charitable foundation which continues to run it as a public garden today. The KBGA is free and open to the public. It also offers a multitude of programs on everything from canning to making beeswax candles! Nissa Dahlin-Brown will share with us the two-century story of the place together with photographs. She'll also update us on ongoing efforts to have the KBGA listed on the National Registry of Historic Places.

Nissa Dahlin-Brown came to Knoxville in 1973 to attend UTK and wound up staying. After a brief time as an historic preservationist at the East Tennessee Development District and architectural firms she moved into higher education and policy studies culminating as founding and associate director of the Howard H. Baker Center. After 33 years at UTK (which included the creation of SCL!) she retired in 2017 from the Baker Center. Thereafter, she returned to her first love, architecture and historic preservation, as director of higher education for the American Institute of Architects in Washington, D.C. where she retired in 2022.

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Tuesday, September 27 2:30 PM Going Once, Going Twice, SOLD! Speaker: Jason Deel

If you've ever attended live auctions, or even watched them on TV, you know that auctions can be entertaining as well as a good way to snare some good bargains. But have you ever thought of what it takes to run an auction? Jason Deel, a local auctioneer, is going to share with us what goes on behind the scenes. Jason will discuss the evolution of the auction industry, how to determine true market value, and when auctions are the best method to buy and sell. He will also discuss how COVID has changed consumer buying habits.

Jason Deel, originally from Haysi, Virginia, is the founder of JD's Realty and Auction of Clinton, Tennessee. He grew up collecting as a child and continued collecting while serving twenty years in the U.S. Army (including six combat deployments in Iraq and Afghanistan.) Jason earned his M.B.A. from Webster University. He continued his education in the field of auctioneering and related studies and is a certified auctioneer and an accredited auctioneer of real estate. He also frequently performs personal property appraisals.

Research in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park over the last 80 Years

Speaker: Paul E. Super

Scientific research in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park has been going on since the park's inception. This presentation will explore many of the top research themes that have taken place over the last 80 years. The topics of this research have included any number of topics including salamanders, bears, fire, acid deposition, elk and the wondrous diversity of life found in the park. Join us to find out not only what has been researched in the past, but also what research is happening now.

Paul E. Super is a biologist employed by the National Park Service as the Science Coordinator at the Appalachian Highlands Learning Center at The Purchase in North Carolina. His latest research project is examining possible indicators of mercury in the Smokies. Paul and his family live in Clyde, North Carolina.

Thursday, September 29 2:30 PM Confessions of a Game Show Queen Speaker: Emily Hendon Thurston

When you sit down to watch your favorite game show do you ever wonder how you yourself might get on a game show, or what it's like to be in the contestant's shoes? Well, wonder no more! Emily Hendon Thurston has been on 4 different game shows in the past 8 years. Emily will take us through the entire game show process from start to finish-how to apply, the auditions, the travel and the most exciting part of all, the taping of the show! She can answer your questions about what it's like to be on stage, talk with the hosts and all the little ins and outs that they don't show on TV.

Emily Hendon Thurston started her game show journey in 2014 with her appearance on *Jeopardy* where she was a one-day

champion! She followed that with appearances on *Who Wants to be a Millionaire, Wheel of Fortune* and *The Chase.* Emily is a voracious consumer of all things trivia-from weekly trivia nights to participating in an online trivia league and attending trivia tournaments every year. Emily has a bachelor's degree in Communication and works as a market research manager in between her trivia(l) pursuits!

Tuesday, October 4 1:00 PM

Exploring the Outer Reaches of Space with the Webb Telescope Speaker: Paul Lewis, Ph.D

So, have you been in awe of the abilities of the Hubble telescope and the images it has sent back to Earth over the last several years? Well, hold on! Launched recently, the James Webb telescope is already sending back even more staggering pictures from space. Whereas Hubble has been in an orbit 340 miles above Earth, Webb is already 1,000,000 miles out in space and is just getting started. The largest and most powerful telescope ever launched, Webb is 100 times more powerful than Hubble and will be able to look back in time to the very earliest periods after the Big Bang! Join us as Paul Lewis brings us up to date on this spectacular space exploration feat and shares with us some of the images that Webb has sent back so far.

Paul Lewis teaches in the Physics Department at UTK and is Director of the department's Space Science Outreach program. In addition, he is a NASA/Jet Propulsion Laboratory Solar System Ambassador.

Tuesday, October 4 2:30 PM

How East Tennessee Almost Became the Union's 36th State Speaker: Henry Wilson, Ph.D.

Some of us know that during the American Civil War West Virginia seceded from Virginia and the Confederacy and became a separate state of the Union. The same almost happened with East Tennessee! For example, did you know that although secession eventually passed after two statewide votes, it failed both times in East Tennessee by a two to one margin? Join us as Henry Wilson examines these events, and why East Tennessee didn't become a separate state. He will also discuss the periods immediately before and after the Civil War as they relate to East Tennessee.

Henry Wilson is a native East Tennessean and retired UTK professor. He taught at the college level for 20 years, teaching both English and History courses. He now teaches Spanish and other subjects at Knox County's senior centers. He loves to answer questions, so come prepared with your own!

The 2022 Congressional Medal of Honor Convention in Knoxville Speaker: Joe Thompson

Each year numerous cities submit applications to the Congressional Medal of Honor Society vying to be selected as the host city for the Society's prestigious annual convention which brings together the living recipients of our country's highest, and rarest, military honor. In 2014 Knoxville was fortunate enough to be selected to hold the event. In 2022 Knoxville was again selected as the host city by an overwhelming vote. The convention will be held here September 6-10. The convention seeks to honor all recipients, living and dead, who have received the award for "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of their lives, above and beyond the call of duty..." Our speaker, Joe Thompson, will give us an overview of the award itself and its history, take a closer look at some of its recipients and tell us all about what happened at this year's celebration.

Joe Thompson is a dynamic speaker who has been the chairman of the Knoxville Medal of Honor Celebration Committee in both 2014 and 2022. He is the Managing Director of Investments for Raymond James in Knoxville.

Remote Area Medical (RAM) Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow Speakers: Angie John and John Volpe

As we know Remote Area Medical (RAM) provides invaluable medical care for the less advantaged members of the community. However, few know how or when it came to be. Our speakers will give us an overview of RAM's history as well as explaining what the organization is doing today-especially how RAM changed, adapted and reimagined its clinics during the pandemic. They will also discuss who they serve and as well as the organization's plans to build the capacity of its clinics to serve more patients and provide more services to the thousands of individuals and families in need.

Angie John and John Volpe both work in the development area of RAM at its offices in Rockford. Angie joined the RAM team in 2019 after a lengthy career in non-profit management and fund raising. John began on staff at RAM in 2021 after serving as a volunteer for 8 years.

The Tennessee Theatre and Its Production of Broadway Shows Speaker: Tom Bugg

The Tennessee Theatre has been presenting touring Broadway shows since the 2008-2009 season. It started with two nights of *Chicago* and this coming season will present 2 weeks (16 shows) of *Hamilton*. The Tennessee has come a long way and overcome the reputation of not being a Broadway town. It has come with many successes and a few pitfalls, but has continued to grow and flourish. How did the Tennessee become a successful Broadway theatre? How are the shows booked, the seasons built and how does the theatre handle shows with eight or nine trucks? Our speaker will give us a behind the scenes look at what goes into bring a Broadway show to Knoxville.

Tom Bugg is in his second stint as General Manager of the

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Tennessee Theatre, and has held that position for the last 15 years. He is also the current General Manager of the Bijou. He is the previous Vice President of Operations at The Peace Center for the Performing Arts in Greeneville, South Carolina. Tom was born and raised in Knoxville and has many fond memories of coming to matinees at the Tennessee as a boy!

The Snakes of East Tennessee Speaker: Michael Ogle

Whether we like it or not we all run into snakes from time to time here in East Tennessee. Our speaker is a long-time herpetologist with the Knoxville Zoo who will familiarize us with the various snakes of East Tennessee. He'll also show us how to tell the venomous ones from the non-venomous ones. In addition, he will bring with him and demonstrate samples of the more common non-venomous snakes that we are likely to encounter in our yards.

Michael Ogle has been with the Knoxville Zoo for 22 years and is the zoo's Curator of Herpetology. While he deals with snakes on a daily basis, his other major focus in herpetology is on turtles and tortoises

The Marble Industry in Knox County and East Tennessee Members of the Brimer Family

Knoxville bears the nickname "The Marble City." Also, a community along Sutherland Ave. in West Knoxville was once known as "Marble City." We even have a new food court downtown named "The Marble City Market." So, why do you not now see more evidence of active marbling operations in Knoxville and East Tennessee? Come and find out the history of this once important part of Knoxville's economy and why Tennessee marble was used so extensively in structures and monuments around the world (including the two famous lions-Patience and Fortitude- that sit outside the New York Public Library.)

Our speakers will be four members of the Brimer family of Knoxville who have owned and operated Brimer Monument Company in Knoxville for over 80 years. Ronnie Brimer, Rhonda Brimer Trupovnieks, Jani Trupovnieks and Susan Brimer Evans will help us understand how the industry came into being, enjoyed widespread success and eventually declined.

Tuesday, October 25 2:30 PM Grandma Gatewood's Walk Speaker: Anne Van Curen

In 1955 Emma "Grandma" Gatewood became the first woman to solo hike the 2,168-mile Appalachian Trail which stretches from Maine to Georgia. She accomplished this feat at the age of 67 after having raised 11 children! In this presentation, our speaker, Anne Van Curen, transforms herself into Emma Gatewood to describe in detail the hike Grandma Gatewood experienced over 60 years ago. Come join us as we learn about the high and low points of this monumental undertaking. (No hiking experience is necessary.)

Anne Van Curen is a registered nurse who lives in Maryville and presently works as a hospice case manager. She is an avid hiker and is currently working on the Appalachian Trail 14 State Challenge.

Thursday, October 27 1:00 PM

Scots-Irish Presbyterians in Early East Tennessee Speaker: Aaron Astor, Ph.D

From the early to late 1700s over 200,000 Scots-Irish from Scotland and Northern Ireland immigrated to the United States. Many of them wound up in the Southeast, especially in the Tennessee Valley. Most were Protestant with a heavy representation of Presbyterians. A proud, independent minded and self-reliant bunch they gave us the NRA, 14 presidents (by one count) and country music. Join us as Dr. Aaron Astor explains the history and culture of this unique group of settlers who had, and still have, a strong influence in our region.

Aaron Astor is a professor of history at Maryville College where he teaches a wide variety of courses concerning the American experience. He is the author of numerous books and is currently working on a book project that explores the 1860 Presidential election as a grassroots phenomenon. He also participates in several historic preservation groups across the state of Tennessee.

Thursday, October 27 2:30 PM The Body Farm Speaker: William M. Bass, Ph.D

By now probably everyone has at least heard of the "Body Farm" here in Knoxville. We are indeed fortunate to have with us for this presentation Dr. William Bass who founded the Body Farm over 40 years ago. The Body Farm (or "U.T. Anthropological Research Facility" as it is more properly referred to) studies the decomposition of bodies for medical, legal and educational purposes. Although there are now 6 other similar facilities in the U.S., Dr. Bass was the first to pioneer this significant advance in the forensic anthropology field. Dr. Bass will share with us the accomplishments and history of the Body Farm and bring us up to date on the research that is currently being carried out there.

William M. Bass is an author, retired professor and former head of the Anthropology Department at UTK. To say he is a luminary in the field of forensic anthropology is a gross understatement. Though retired, at the age of 93 he still plays an active role in U.T.'s forensic anthropology program.
